We all met at the Studio and were shown around by two very entertaining guides who had both before retiring, been working as Journalists at the ABC studios for the past 30 years or so, and went on to explain and to show us how it all had changed in recent years.

There are fewer programmes coming out of Brisbane, as most of the programmes go to Sydney to be put together and presented. This is supposed to be for continuity, efficiency of labour and cost containment, but I think it is not the labour that costs, it is the equipment needed to do the work.

UNLOCKING THE MYSTERIES OF OUR THREE LEGS - DAVE KNEALE

It's perhaps the ultimate Manx symbol, but where does it come from? A new book aims to unlock the mysteries of the distinctive and ubiquitous Three Legs of Mann.

Sara Goodwins, author of 'Three Legs Good' that celebrates the history of the Three Legs of Mann symbol 'Three Legs Good', published by Loaghtan Books, celebrates the Manx triskelion and explores the history of the symbol and its origins. Author Sara Goodwins, who lives in Ramsey, told the Manx Independent: 'I'm a comeover, and the first time I visited the island about 25 years ago I saw the symbol everywhere. 'It's distinctive, eye-catching and also quite odd when you think about it. 'There was obviously great pride in the symbol, but I noticed people weren't always sure where it really comes from.'

The Manx version of the triskelion is believed to have been adopted as a royal coat of arms in the island during the 13th century, but the symbol's origins go much further into the past, taking in Celtic and even classical history. 'From a Manx point of view the earliest examples are on the Manx Sword of State and on the Maughold stone cross, but it appears even earlier elsewhere in the world,' Sara said. 'The spiral symbol goes back several thousand years, and the three legs themselves appeared about 500BC in ancient Greece.'

The book features full colour photographs of some of the most distinctive examples of the symbol to be found around the Isle of Man. '*Three Legs Good*' is available in the island's bookshops for £4.95, or can be ordered online at www.loaghtanbooks.com

STEAM TRAIN TO THE RESCUE BY ADRIAN DARBYSHIRE

In scenes straight out of Thomas the Tank Engine, a steam engine *Loch* had to come to the rescue when the railway's new diesel loco broke down.

Guests on the Valentine's Massacre Murder Mystery train were left stranded for a time at Santon on Friday night when the US-built diesel conked out. Steam engine **Loch** was sent from Douglas to rescue the dining train. Director of public transport lan Longworth said: 'Unfortunately a contactor needed adjustment which is a small job.

'Since it was the first time we had the problem we recovered the train rather than risk it taking longer than we expected. The passengers were just over an hour late but being the dining train we were able to entertain them during the delay. The diesel was fixed very quickly Saturday morning as it was only a small adjustment to the contactor and is in use again today on a works train. Just part of learning about the new technology and us not taking risks in the dark.'

The diesel-electric, costing £400,000, was shipped to the island in December 2013. But it was soon consigned to the shed after being beset with engine problems. A new engine had to be fitted, at the manufacturer's own cost, but teething troubles continued involving the air intake temperature. It was finally declared 'serviceable' last July.

Liberal Vannin MHK Peter Karran (Onchan) has tabled a House of Keys question on the cost of purchasing the diesel, what business plan for it was made, what use has been made of the machine and whether it is 'fit for purpose'.
