A ROAMING DAY IN RAMSEY



We rose to find a fine day with calm waters on Laxey Bay. Our B & B was located high above the road into Laxey from Douglas, with views out over the Bay towards England. We decided to go to Ramsey and maybe tour around the north of the Island afterwards. After a leisurely breakfast, we headed off in time to see Ramsey, have lunch and then set off further north and west. On the way, we notice a sign indicating "Ballaglass Glen" on the right so decided to check it out on the way back to the B & B. When we arrived in Ramsey, we drove around to see the layout and appreciate the features to the town. We went through town down to the port area and then back over the Mooragh Promenade Swing Bridge. We travelled back to the tram terminus area and parked. Walking from there we were able to check out the trams at the terminus, Information Centre (Old Tram Station), the new Tram Station and past the old houses along the street leading to the centre of town.















The photos we took tell the story of what we saw and the interesting features of trams and houses. We arrived at the centre in time to see the local school children singing outside the Post Office. It is a shame that I cannot play the video of their song, but it was a lovely tune and was well sung by the students.













After sightseeing in the civic centre we returned to our car and drove down to Queens Promenade near the Queens Pier and parked. We bought lunch and sat looking out over the water and the Pier while we ate.





Returning home, we pulled into the parking area at Ballaglass Glen in the parish of Maughold. It is actually a part of Cornaa Glen. Ballaglass totals about 17 acres and has a wide reputation for its charm and beauty. It has a lovely rock-bedded stream, heavy foliaged land and an abundance of bluebells in springtime. The glen is very popular with artists and photographers. The name Ballaglass could be translated to 'Farm of the Stream'.

The remains of a flax mill and the stone buildings, which once belonged to a lead mine, run by the Great Mona Mining Company, can still be seen in the glen. The mine was very short lived due to the poor grade and low quantity of lead discovered.

The glen was a favourite haunt of the Manx poet 'T. E. Brown' and Cornaa River has at times been known as 'The Musical Stream" when flowing down through Ballaglass. It is a favourite spot for attracting artists.

The old entrance to the glen was at the bottom and the owner of the land erected a gate in 1980 which caused a storm of protests but free access was given. In 1989, a small parcel of land on the northern side of the glen was purchased from the owner for £3,000, thereby allowing access into the glen from what had become a car park. This is where we parked and walked down into the glen to see the beauty.

The glen was like a tropical forest with lots of foliage, moss and glimpses of sunlight streaming through the tree tops. After spending a very enjoyable stroll through the Glen that followed our roaming around Ramsey, we headed home to freshen up for an evening meal.
